Dementia Action Plan

September 2020







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We launched ourselves as a dementia-friendly organisation in 2017 and have since sought to embed our focus on dementia in our housing, care and support. The existing action plan has resulted in initiatives being undertaken across the organisation and dementia being embedded as BAU. However, there is still more which can be done to support our staff, residents, families and friends. We are also committed to using our knowledge and expertise to contribute to the challenge of dementia in society by being part of networks and working with other housing providers to influence the housing sector.

The Housing Quality Standards have been introduced and these include actions which should be taken locally around dementia, so this action plan presents what work should be undertaken at that local level and what needs to be coordinated or developed centrally.

We continue to advocate internally and externally that good quality appropriate housing is important for empowering people affected by dementia to live as well as they can.

There are currently five Dementia Advocates. Recruitment of more was interrupted due to Covid 19 but will be resumed. One Dementia Advocate per region is the target.

This action plan outlines what we will do as an organisation, both internally and externally, to support our residents and staff affected by dementia.

Aims:

To ensure that dementia is considered in all parts of the organisation and in all the services which we offer to residents and staff.

To raise awareness of the importance of appropriate housing for people affected by dementia in the wider housing sector.

We will achieve this through the following strands:



Providing information and raising awareness







1. Providing information and raising awareness



The overall aims of this strand are to:

- > Keep staff, residents and their families or friends informed of our work on dementia
- > Better equip staff with resources to provide additional information
- > Give staff the opportunity to access further support

We will assess whether we have achieved this by:

- > Evidence collected through the HQS
- > Evidence collected through ongoing monitoring of the work of the Dementia Advocates
- > Numbers of Dementia Friends made
- > Court Manager Survey questions
